


- All students bring strengths

Support educators and leaders with ongoing coaching and professional development to implement best practices for EL success.




Purpose and Goals for Teaching Staff:




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What Coaching Looks Like for Teaching Staff

- Collaborative **planning** and **lesson design** with colleagues.
- Classroom observations and **reflective feedback** from coaches and colleagues.
- **Modeling** of designated and integrated ELD instruction
- Data-informed **goal setting** with instructional leaders and teachers.

- Increased **educator confidence** and **instructional clarity**.

<p>2.1 Language Development Integrated with Content — in and across the Curriculum: e.g.,</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Curriculum is interdisciplinary and engaging, fostering student's language development through thematic units. Curriculum is standards-based, learning is grounded in the standards-based curriculum. Curriculum is integrated throughout the day (Integrated ELA/ELD, social studies, science, and the arts) and organized thematically with interconnectivity related to language development. There are language targets and content goals/ objectives to ensure curricular units are responsive to students' linguistic and academic needs. Language and content objectives guide planning—and include the use of ELD standards to plan differentiated performance tasks and activities. Strategies match the text types being studied and align with writing goals. Differentiated ELD is planned in response to student need and/or in preparation for the language demands of the academic content being studied. Developing language awareness is an overarching focus for all instruction. 				
<p>2.2 Active Engagement/Critical Thinking and Inquiry-Based Learning: e.g.,</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Language is developed through hands-on, highly engaging content that is appropriate for students' interests and abilities. Classrooms align with language—students are USING language to engage with the content being studied, and for multiple purposes, which are made explicit by the teacher. Teacher uses a variety of questioning—but always includes a open-ended, high-level, critical thinking questions. Teacher values and rewards curiosity and innovation by encouraging students to question and investigate/research topics—and provides ways for students to contribute to classroom learning. Students are invited to go beyond things up to topics to pursue answers to their questions. Class activities engage students in sharing work and gathering feedback from peers. The teacher engages meaningful project-based and inquiry-based research and homework.
