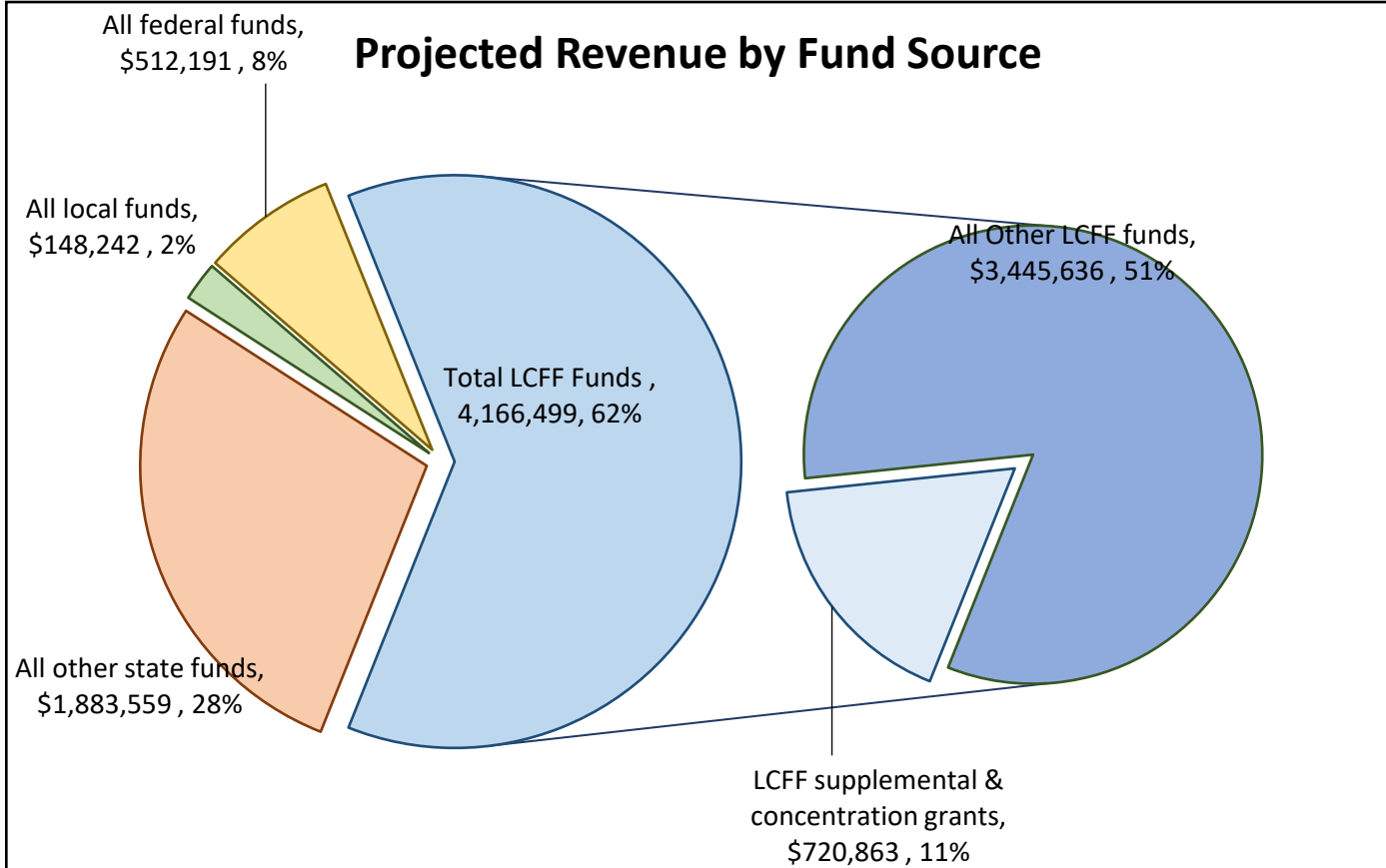

Projected Revenue by Fund Source

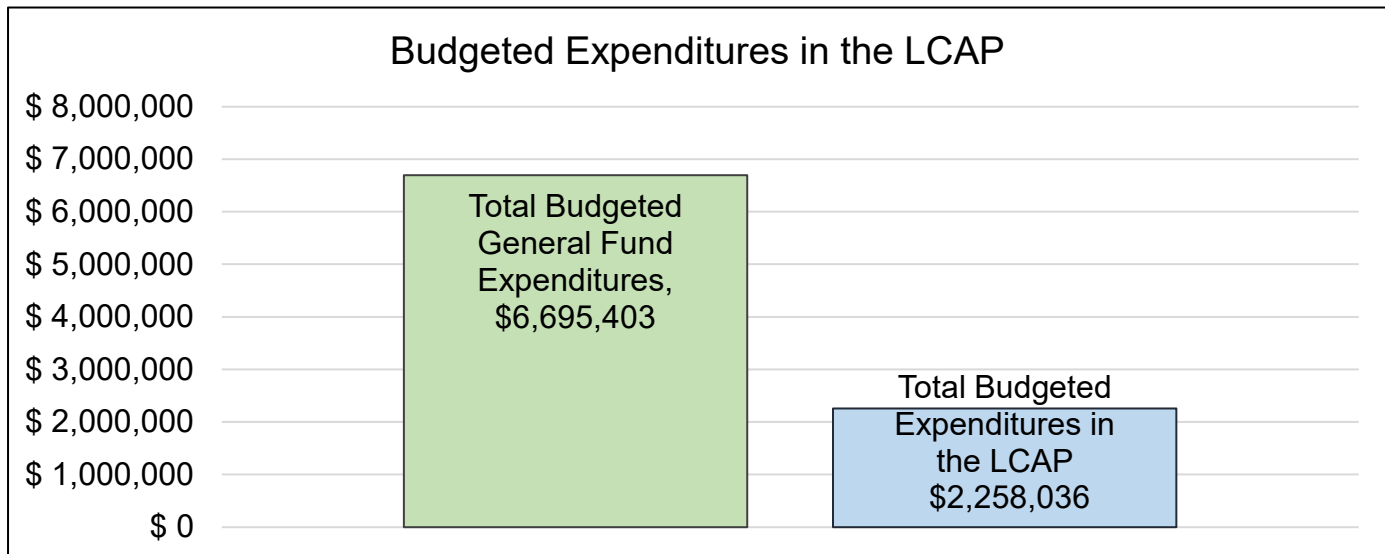


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Rocketship Redwood City expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

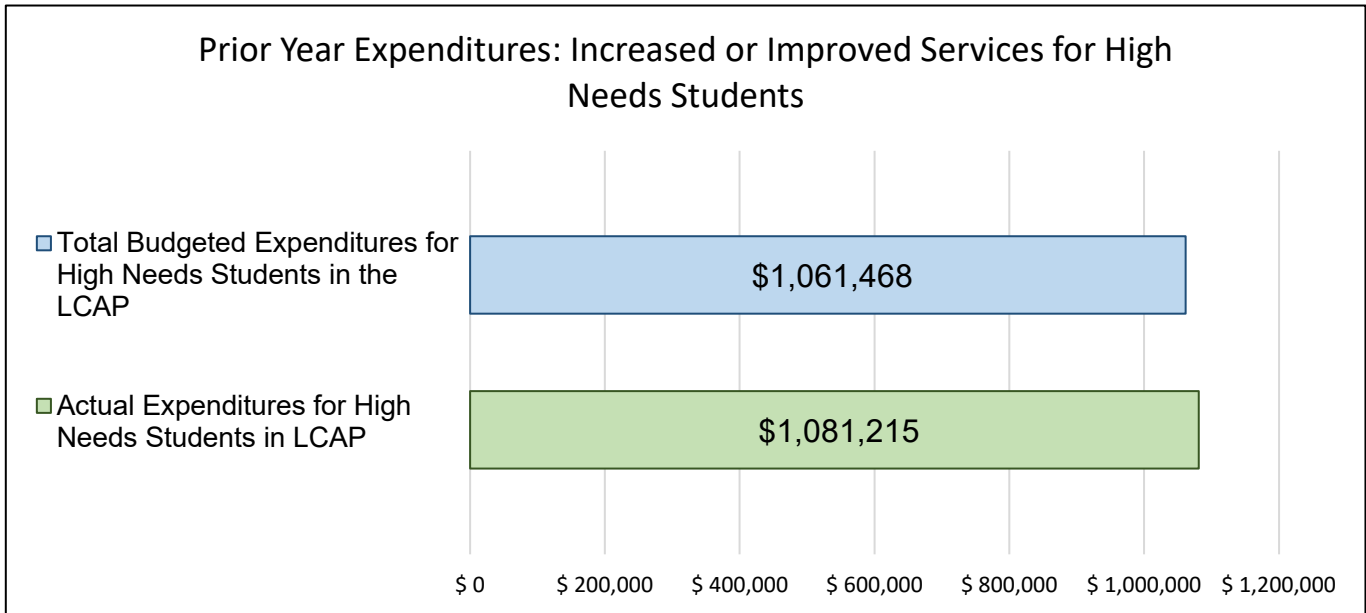

In 2026-27, Rocketship Redwood City is projecting it will receive \$720,863.22 based on the enrollment of foster youth, English learner, and low-income students. Plan Summary 2026-27

General Information

Rocketship Redwood City Prep opened in August 2015 and was the 11th Rocketship campus to open in the Bay Area, but the first Rocketship campus to open outside of San Jose, in Redwood City. It was started in response to overwhelming parent support in the area. The school serves 275 students in grades TK-5. Approximately 88% of the students are socioeconomically disadvantaged, 16% are Homeless Youth, 72% are English learners, and 95% are Hispanic/Latinx. Additionally, 8% of students qualify for special education services.

Rocketship Redwood City Prep operates a highly personalized educational model to serve the unique needs of our students. At Rocketship, personalized learning is about reaching each student with the right content at the right time using the right method of instruction. Our teachers lead the learning process for every single student we serve in both whole group grade level instruction and differentiated instruction that meets students at their individual level. We use tutors and adaptive online learning programs to augment teacher-led instruction and provide valuable time for students to practice new concepts and develop the mastery they need to advance. Given the majority FRL and EL population, Rocketship Redwood City Prep’s instructional program is built around ELD principles and recognizes incoming students may be several grade levels behind. As a result, all teachers are trained in Guided Language Acquisition Design, small group instruction and differentiation to meet the needs of all students in their classrooms.

Rocketship Redwood City Prep also operates under the principles that excellent teachers and leaders create transformational schools and engaged families are essential in eliminating the achievement gap. To these ends, Rocketship invests deeply in training and development to ensure teachers and leaders have a profound impact on students and communities and Rocketship families are actively engaged in our schools, from reading in the classroom to chaperoning field trips. We also develop parent leaders in our schools and communities to become powerful advocates for their children. More details regarding how we implement personalized learning, teacher development and parent engagement follow.

All Rocketship campuses share four core values-- respect, responsibility, empathy and persistence—and develop a fifth core value as a community. At Rocketship Redwood City Prep this fifth core value is bravery. Bravery at RRWC means to be confident in your abilities and be able to advocate for yourself.

The purpose of this Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) is to address the School Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA) for Rocketship Redwood City Prep which is the Schoolwide Program; herein referred to as the LCAP. The Charter School’s plan is to effectively meet the ESSA Requirements in alignment with the LCAP and other federal, state and local programs. The plans included in the LCAP address these

requirements compliant to include focusing on five goals: Improve Rocketeers' proficiency in key content areas, overall and for key subgroups; Rocketeers will be taught by highly qualified teachers and educators with robust training and development on common core standards aligned curriculum; School environment will be safe, welcoming, joyful, and efficient for all students and families; Rocketship students will have access to opportunities that support them to become well-rounded, self motivated, engaged community members; Rocketship families are engaged in their students' education and advocate for their communities. The Charter School completed a comprehensive needs assessment of the entire school which included an analysis of verifiable state data as well as local performance data used to measure student outcomes as evidenced in the annual update portion of the LCAP. The needs assessment process included meeting families, classified staff, teachers and administrators to identify areas of opportunity for the students and groups of students who are not achieving standard mastery and to identify strategies which will be implemented in the LCAP to address those areas of opportunity.

The identification of the process for evaluating and monitoring the implementation of the LCAP and the progress toward accomplishing the established goals will include discussing the actions and services with the use of supplemental funds at the school level through the Parent Advisory Council which will include parents of English Learners. The Parent Advisory Council will meet four times per year to inform the process. Parents, classified staff, certificated staff and an administrator will make up the council. The number of parents will exceed or be equal to the number of total staff members. The council will discuss academic performance, supplemental services and areas to make improvements with Title funds as part of the School Plan included in the LCAP conversations at the meeting in the fall and at the meeting in the spring. The teachers, staff, students and parents also participate in an annual survey which provides feedback on the goals and services. The teachers, staff and administrators actively participate in the decision making process throughout the year and during LCAP workshops. The decisions will take into account the needs of Rocketship Redwood City based on student achievement data to include SBAC, ELPAC, and interim assessment data such as NWEA MAP, cumulative assessments, and attendance and student demographic data to include the significant subgroups of Latino, Black or African American, White, socioeconomically disadvantaged, students with disabilities, and English Learners. This student achievement data and student demographic data will be used as a basis for making decisions about the use of supplemental federal funds and the development of policies on basic core services.

Each goal includes actions and services that address the needs of all students and significant subgroups which include evidence-based strategies that provide opportunities for all children, methods and instructional strategies, and particular focus on students at risk of not meeting the State academic standards.

2023 Dashboard Reflections for the Lowest Performing Indicators

RRWC has identified a need in English Language Arts for the Hispanic (Red, -72.8) and English Learner (Red, -90.6) student groups. We will address this need by implementing Required Action 1.1 Personalized Learning, and 1.3 Services to Support Multilingual Students. We implemented ML Supports in 23-24 with greater fidelity than ever, and we plan to continue this focus.

RRWC has identified a need in English Learner Progress (Red, 33.8%). We will address this need by implementing Required Action 1.3 Services to Support Multilingual Students.

2025 Dashboard Reflections

RRWC demonstrated significant academic growth in 2024–25, with substantial gains in English Language Arts (+34.3) and Mathematics (+37.9). These improvements were observed across all students and student subgroups. This success can be attributed in large part to strong teacher and staff retention, which has allowed for sustained professional development over multiple years. Ongoing cycles of coaching and feedback have focused on accelerating student achievement and refining instructional practices. Additionally, the math curriculum has now been implemented for several years, and teachers have developed a deeper understanding of how to effectively support students with diverse learning needs through its use.

The school also made notable progress in English Learner outcomes, increasing English Learner Progress by 44.6 percentage points. In 2025, 53.6% of English learners made progress or maintained the highest level on the ELPAC. This growth reflects a focused emphasis over the past year on designated ELD (DELD) curriculum, supported through coaching and consistent implementation with fidelity. The pilot of a new ELD curriculum further contributed to student advancement, particularly in supporting movement from the Emerging to Expanding level. Moving forward, the school will continue to prioritize support for multilingual learners through Action 1.3: Services to Support Multilingual Students.

In addition, RRWC maintained a 0% suspension rate (Blue indicator), reflecting the effectiveness of Action 4.3: Social Emotional Learning. This outcome is the result of strong implementation of restorative practices and meaningful partnerships with families to ensure students have the support needed to remain engaged and on campus. These systems have contributed to a positive school climate and reduced exclusionary discipline practices.

Chronic Absenteeism, however, remains an area of concern, with the school earning a Red indicator for all students and all subgroups due to an increased chronic absence rate of 34.6%. This has been a persistent challenge since the pandemic. In response, the school will continue to strengthen implementation of Action 4.4: Care Corps and Action 5.5: Attendance Initiatives. This year, the Care Corps Coordinator is on site and working closely with the Principal to implement tiered levels of support. This includes proactively holding meetings with families before students become chronically absent. There has also been an increased emphasis on communicating the impact of absences on academic growth. The school is working to identify and address root causes of attendance issues in order to improve outcomes in this area.

Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG)

RRWC has \$28,030 in unexpended LREBG funds for the 2026-27 school year.

The RRWC needs assessment substantiated findings from the 2025 Dashboard related to student academic needs in English Language Arts and Mathematics for the students with disabilities subgroup.

RRWC students need tailored supports to remove barriers to success.

Although RRWC runs an inclusion model, we realize that our students with disabilities (SWD) may require additional academic, social-emotional, and adaptive skills support to be successful learners. These additional supports include additional assessments, such as psycho-educational assessments, speech-language assessments and occupational therapy assessments; additional staffing supports, such as adaptive PE instructors, physical therapists, mental health supports and assistive technology specialists; additional materials, including

instructional supplies for speech lessons, counseling materials for school psychologists and occupational therapy materials; and adaptive technology.

This falls under the allowable uses of the LREBG funding by providing additional staffing to reduce teacher:student ratios. Metrics 1.1 and 1.2 CAASPP ELA and Math: % Met or Exceeded Standard for students with disabilities will be used to monitor the effectiveness of this action.

Various	The School Site Council, which fulfills the LCAP Parent Advisory Committee role, is composed of parents and staff. The SSC and English Learner Advisory Council (ELAC) met quarterly throughout the year to reflect on data and provide input on plan development. Our School Site Council participated in a needs analysis process and identified the key successes and challenges for RRWC based on the CA School Dashboard for 2025 (See Reflections: Annual Performance) and more recent data aligned to Dashboard indicators. Our SSC and ELAC committees met for LCAP consultation on 2/11/26, 3/4/26, 4/15/26, 5/15/26. Community Members are invited to participate in any and all open community engagement, including Regional Community Advisory Board Meetings. Advocates are invited to participate in any and all open community engagement. Tribes are not applicable. We consulted our SELPA for LCAP input in May of 2026. Parents have the opportunity to provide feedback on services and supports for students with disabilities via the El Dorado Charter SELPA's Community Advisory Committee (CAC) either as participants or as board-approved voting members. Our board meets quarterly as a public hearing with the opportunity for public comment. We promoted parent participation in public meetings and public hearings through website and agenda posting. Virtual meetings conducted via video conference had telephone call-in access. We provided translation as needed. The LCAP Public hearing was held on May 27, 2026. The LCAP was adopted on June 11, 2026.
Parents	Parents provided LCAP feedback throughout the year through various parent engagement opportunities. These opportunities include, but are not limited to, monthly coffee chats with the principal–Cafecitos held the first Wednesday of every month beginning in September, community meetings, and 1:1 meetings with the school leadership team. They also provided feedback through surveys (network and informal school-specific), including the Annual Parent Survey (March 2026).
Teachers, School Staff, Administrators	Teachers, school staff, and school administrators provided LCAP feedback throughout the year in a variety of ways--during regular staff meetings, 1:1 meetings, Chat and Chew feedback meetings (9/17/26), monthly Cafecitos and staff surveys, Data Day and P.D.reflections, plus informal surveys to solicit input on specific aspects of plans.
Students	Teachers held Community Meetings with students regarding their experience, perspectives, and needs. Teachers shared student feedback from these discussions with school leadership to inform plans. Students also provided input on the Student Survey (Winter 2025).

Action 1.3 was modified based on teacher and administrator feedback that the ELPAC Interim Assessment should be discontinued due to time demands, limited instructional usefulness of the data, and overall assessment burden on students. An English Language Development Progress Monitoring (ELD PM) tool was implemented to monitor student progress during instruction in place of it.

Action 1.4 Special Education Supports: Input was gathered during IEP meetings, parent conferences, and School Site Council and English Learner Advisory Committee (SSC/ELAC) meetings throughout the school year. Families and staff emphasized the importance of increased access to specialized services, improved communication between home and school, and expanded mental health supports. This input will guide continued investment in staffing, improved scheduling of services, and enhanced family communication systems moving forward.

Goal 2 analysis includes the following feedback from teachers: Appreciation was expressed for the increased visibility of coaches in classrooms this year, as well as for the team's efforts to implement the program despite beginning the year with one fewer administrator. Moving forward, there is a desire to see stronger professional development supports established from the start of the school year. Additionally, staff would like weekly planning time to begin in September rather than October next year.

Goal 4 analysis includes student feedback: students express appreciation for the increased opportunities for earning rewards that can be spent at the student store.

Closing the achievement gap and creating educational equity is of the highest priority for our school. The actions in this goal are designed to develop proficiency in key content areas, combining rigorous grade level instruction with personalization and student supports. The aligned metrics support progress monitoring by capturing growth and proficiency in ELA, Math, Science, and English Language Development. We are proud of the progress of our students and must continue our actions to sustain this progress. We will measure the effectiveness of 1.1 Personalized Learning, 1.2 Special Education Supports, and 1.4 Rocketship Reads actions using the CAASPP ELA, Math, and Science metrics, as well as NWEA Reading and Math results. We will measure the effectiveness of 1.3 Services to Support Multilingual Students through English Learner Progress Indicator and EL Reclassification Rate metrics.

Goal Analysis for 2025-26

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

All Goal 1 actions were implemented as planned, with the exception of Action 1.3 (Services to Support Multilingual Learners), where adjustments were made.

1.1 Personalized Learning

Small group instruction improved, resulting in more students receiving instruction at their appropriate level with targeted support to advance. Progress monitoring systems were strengthened using multiple measures to better inform instruction. Next year the school will pilot a new MTSS platform to better identify students for tutoring and track their progress. A key challenge was addressing a wide range of student needs within classrooms. Variability in student levels made it difficult to consistently group students and deploy staff strategically.

Personalized learning through online programs has also been a strong area of success, helping ensure that students are working at the appropriate level and can engage in meaningful independent practice. However, student absences can disrupt progress, as missed time makes it difficult for students to complete assigned work. Additionally, dually identified students were initially tasked with multiple personalized learning programs, leading to an overwhelming workload. In response, adjustments were made mid-year to scale back general education program requirements, resulting in a more manageable and balanced assignment load for these students.

1.2 Special Education Supports

Additional assessments and expanded services improved timely identification of student needs and allowed for more targeted interventions. Increased collaboration among staff strengthened implementation of the inclusion model. Students showed improved access to grade-level curriculum, and use of assistive technology increased to support learning and independence.

1.3 Services to Support Multilingual Learners

The ELPAC Interim Assessment was discontinued due to time demands, limited instructional usefulness of the data, and overall assessment burden on students. An English Language Development Progress Monitoring (ELD PM) tool was implemented to monitor student progress during instruction. Teachers used the tool biweekly to identify focus skills and inform grouping for Designated ELD. Implementation improved clarity around high-quality ELD instruction and supported identification of students and skills for re-teaching. Over 80% of newcomer students receiving targeted support demonstrated growth on post-assessments. As a first-year implementation, challenges included inconsistent data collection, limited clarity on the rubric, and varying teacher capacity to use the tool effectively. Despite this, available data was used to guide instruction.

1.4 Rocketship Reads

The school community engages in “Tranquil Tuesdays” when all students “Drop Everything and Read” once a week during Launch in order to foster a love of reading. One challenge with the Rocketship reads campaign is with the shift to using the DIBELS assessments to track reading levels, it is more difficult to match students with books at the appropriate independent reading level.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Action 1.2 Special Education Supports budgeted expenditures \$ 203,094 and estimated actuals \$ 437,959 difference was due to the increased need for special education contracted staff due to open roles and higher than anticipated special education support needs. Contracted staff are more expensive than hiring internal staff.

Action 1.3 Services to Support Multilingual Learners budgeted expenditures \$ 43,120 and estimated actuals \$ 38,616 difference was due to the ELL software and multi-lingual support staff compensation costs being lower than expected.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The 1.1 Personalized Learning and 1.5 Rocketship Reads actions have been showing effectiveness overall, as evidenced by increased scores on the CAASPP ELA, Math and Science assessments. NWEA K-2, where we approached our target in Reading and exceeded it in Math.

Our tier 2 supports during Learning Lab are showing effectiveness with 53% of students provided Tier 2 support by a tutor Tier 2 during Learning Lab time meeting their Dibels Reading growth target for Fall to Winter.

1.2 Special Education Supports actions were somewhat effective in making progress toward the goal. While key supports and inclusive practices were implemented, CAASPP outcomes for Students with Disabilities showed limited or inconsistent growth across content areas. These results suggest a need for stronger alignment of services, more consistent implementation of inclusive practices, and more strategic staffing to better support student progress.

The specific investments for intervention include Intervention curriculum and tutors. Our objective every day is to get the right lesson to the right child at the right time. We assume that every child, especially the children in the neighborhoods we serve, will have unique learning needs that must be addressed individually. The Rocketship model combines traditional classroom instruction with blended learning, which enables online learning programs technology, small group instruction and tutoring. 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1.2	Special Education Supports (LREBG)	Although RRWC runs an inclusion model, we recognize that our students with disabilities (SWD) require additional academic, social-emotional, and adaptive supports to be successful. For 2026–27, the school will deepen its commitment to inclusive practices by strengthening co-teaching models, increasing professional development on Universal Design for Learning (UDL), differentiation, and accommodations, and ensuring students have greater access to grade-level curriculum within the general education setting. Strategic staffing decisions will be prioritized to better align services to student needs, including more intentional scheduling of special education staff, related service providers, and support personnel to maximize push-in services and minimize instructional disruption. 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1.3	Services to Support Multilingual Students	Our continued goal is that emerging bilingual students make steady progress towards English language proficiency, by growing at least one level on the ELPAC assessment and reach proficiency prior to 5th grade. This will also benefit students in their access to content instruction, as students who have been reclassified have sustained academic achievement each year. Last year 25-26, we continued to focus on EL Roadmap Principle 2 by explicitly teaching ELD during protected time of the day and focusing on higher quality Tier 1 instruction through the use of stronger integrated ELD strategies. We focused on comprehensible input such as vocabulary building, sentence frames for oral language development, and language level prompting to engage students in content. This focus was elevated by GLAD strategies through professional development and coaching support. We invested in an internal English Language Development Progress Monitoring Tool (ELD PM) that requires teachers to use a rubric aligned to the CA ELD Stands Proficiency Level Descriptors to assess student's language abilities. Newcomer supports were amplified through Multilingual Learner Specialists who provided additional direct services to students, where students engage in lessons that addressed not only their English language acquisition needs, but also their social emotional needs. With bilingual Multilingual Learner Specialists, students received home language supports to accelerate English language acquisition. We also continue to elect ELAC Ambassadors to increase family voice in the program implementation and family partnership, and at home supports. In 26-27, we will continue to have strong DELD instruction through coaching, clear look fors, and data analysis of the ELD PM. For integrated ELD strategies, we will continue to use comprehensible input and GLAD strategies so that students move along the language continuum. Goal Analysis for 2025-26

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

All Goal 2 actions were implemented as planned.

2.1 High-Quality, Research-Based Curriculum: CKLA Integrated and Knowledge was successfully adopted across campuses, with aligned unit launches and bi-weekly coaching cycles supporting implementation. Key challenges included differentiating instruction for below-grade-level readers while maintaining access to grade-level content, as well as the learning curve associated with a new curriculum. Initial differentiation resources have been developed and will continue to be refined. However, the math curriculum has now been implemented for several years, and teachers have developed a deeper understanding of how to effectively support students with diverse learning needs through its use.

2.2 Professional Development: Expanding new educator orientation into a three-day experience strengthened alignment and collaboration. The primary challenge was differentiating support for new and returning teachers implementing the same curriculum, which will be refined moving forward.

Appreciation was expressed by RRWC teachers for the increased visibility of coaches in classrooms this year, as well as for the team's efforts to implement the program despite beginning the year with one fewer administrator. Moving forward, there is a desire to see stronger professional development supports established from the start of the school year. Additionally, staff would like weekly planning time to begin in September rather than October next year.

2.3 Data-Driven Instructional Practices: Progress monitoring for English Learners and adoption of Amira improved efficiency and data use. The main area for growth is building teacher capacity to analyze data and take effective instructional action.

2.4 Instructional Coaching: New coaching tools strengthened coaches' ability to diagnose and develop teacher practice. Coaching in the moment has helped teachers to better understand their data. Coaching practices were refined this year at RRWC to provide more effective feedback on lesson planning, along with regular classroom walkthroughs to ensure teachers are meeting high expectations for instructional practice. A key challenge is accelerating the development of first-year coaches.

2.5 Teacher Credentialing

Rocketship Public Schools has significantly expanded educator development pathways through strengthened university partnerships, increasing access to degree, intern, and residency programs. Through partnerships with Reach University and Rivet School, 10 staff members have earned bachelor's degrees and 15 are currently enrolled, creating a pipeline into credential programs and teaching roles. Rocketship currently supports over 75 educators across credentialing pathways, including Multiple Subject, Education Specialist, and PK–3 programs through Reach University, San José State University, Santa Clara County, and Loyola Marymount University. For the 2025–2026 school year, this includes 44 participants in the Reach Intern Program, 18 enrolled at SJSU (with 15 additional projected), 1 participant in the PK–3 pathway, and 5 residents in LMU's program. The Credentialing & Compliance Team partners closely with universities to streamline program implementation, allowing educators to focus on instructional practice and student outcomes. This expansion reflects significant growth from prior years when Reach was the sole partner. Looking ahead, Rocketship aims to enroll over 50 staff members in intern programs for the 2026–2027 school year.

2.6 Culturally Responsive Pedagogy: The school successfully implemented the Kimochois SEL curriculum in TK–2. The next step is refining a stronger SEL approach for grades 3–5 in 2026–2027.

- Action 2.1 High Quality, Research-based Curriculum budgeted expenditures \$ 25,395 and estimated actuals \$ 35,991 difference was due to Core curriculum expenses being higher than budgeted.
- 2.5 Teacher Credentialing budgeted expenditures \$ 5,127 and estimated actuals \$ 11,482 difference was due to more credentialing support being needed for teachers than initially expected, and higher than anticipated costs from external partnership with Reach University.

The High Quality, Research Based Curriculum, Professional Development, Assessments, Data Days, Coaching, and Culturally Responsive Pedagogy actions were highly effective as evidenced by our strong implementation of adopted standards including ELD standards, combined with excellent instructional materials provided to all students, and by our assessment results (see Goal 1) which show growth and progress toward our targets. The Teacher Credentialing action was highly effective as evidenced by the Number/% of total and EL teachers credentialed & properly assigned: 100%.

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2.2	Professional Development	Professional Development is a critical component of the RRWC program. We will continue to implement a comprehensive program of professional development informed by data and best practices in order to continually improve and progress toward our goals. We will continue to build on the increased differentiation of professional development for teachers and leaders to better meet the adults where they are at. We will adapt the content of professional development as needed, based on the needs of our students, and we will adjust summer professional development for each subsequent year to better prepare teachers and leaders to meet the needs. Goal Analysis for 2025-26

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

All Goal 3 actions were implemented as planned. Successes and Challenges: In 3.1 Operations Staffing & Development, additional training provided for operations specialists at the start of the year led to improved implementation of recess protocols, ultimately enhancing student engagement and joy. In 3.2 Facilities Maintenance, training operations staff on space-management systems has streamlined teacher access

to materials and improved internal ratings for physical space utilization. As RRWC leases its facilities from the school district, the school partners closely with the district for the repair and maintenance of many facility components. To strengthen this collaboration, RRWC is developing more consistent systems for communication, including quarterly check-ins, to ensure facility needs are clearly conveyed and appropriately prioritized. In 3.3 Safety Training, it has been difficult for the BOMs to conduct the weekly safety walkthroughs, where they check all security systems on campus at random times to ensure they are being implemented as planned. Additional attention is being placed on conducting these safety walkthroughs each week to ensure regularity.

Regarding 3.4 School-wide Operational Systems & Routines, high student support needs earlier this year led to less frequent one-on-one meetings between the Business Operations Manager (BOM) and Operations Specialists. Schedules have since been adjusted to ensure all specialists receive their planned support moving forward. Survey feedback indicates that 90% of BOMs are very satisfied or satisfied with the monthly professional development provided. Operations staff also had positive feedback about the training provided during the summer and wished a similar training could occur in the middle of the year.

Action 3.2 Facilities Maintenance Budgeted expenditures \$ 125,120 and estimated actuals \$ 196,667 difference was due to higher building repair and custodial service expenses than planned due to the need for additional cleaning and interior painting.

Action 3.3 Safety Training budgeted expenditures \$ 11,931 and estimated actuals \$ 13,935 difference was due to cost of safety materials and Business Operations Manager (BOM) compensation costs being higher than planned.

We placed a heavy emphasis on campus safety and improving our systems for operations, and we will continue this work. Overall, our family survey results were very strong in operations.

As a result, we invest in necessary repairs and upgrades to ensure the school is a safe and welcoming environment for students, families and staff. Our school will invest in new furniture to replace aging furniture items. This contributes to a feeling of safety in the classroom. We will continue to update and upgrade technology that is used for instruction in the classrooms. 3.3	Safety Training	We annually update our school safety plan, including feedback from the police and fire departments. In alignment with these plans, we provide a full program of safety training and information to be shared with staff, students and parents. We conduct three annual safety audits to ensure that all safety procedures are being followed, and this feedback is provided to the BOM so they can act on it to ensure all protocols are being followed on campus, including streamlined sign-in procedures for all staff and visitors that provide for a timely understanding of who is entering our school. Goal Analysis for 2025-26

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

All Goal 4 actions were implemented as planned.

In 4.1 **Enrichment**, the school implemented a new virtual reality coding enrichment for upper grade students led by the STEAM teacher. Students from the school have been invited to Google Demo Day to present their projects at the Google Sunnyvale offices. At times successful implementation has been challenging due to staffing shortages this year.

In 4.2 **Outdoor Education and Community Experiences**, we held successful science camp trips for grades 4 and 5, as indicated by positive student and family feedback. A challenge in 4.2 is the scheduling of the trips in the effort to balance availability and competing calendar events.

In **4.3 Social Emotional Learning**, students have expressed appreciation for the increased opportunities to earn rewards that can be used at the student store. Teachers and administrators have also valued the reintroduction of the Kimoichis SEL curriculum in the lower grades, particularly its use of visual models to support students in expressing feelings and engaging in appropriate interactions.

Through the **4.4 Care Corps** action, the schools are providing support to thousands of families across the network. Our Care Closet provides free clothing to 50-100 families each month and our food distribution program serves 800 families each month. Vision to Learn is screening and testing all students and those that require additional care get free glasses and/or a referral to a specialist and support throughout that process from our Care Corps Coordinators.

Additionally, 225 families graduated from Rocketship Parent University, and we added a new set of sessions this fall with the same topics but added more mental health, parenting, grieving, and financial literacy workshops. We also partnered with a technology high school in Palo Alto who donated 25 Mac laptops to our families.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Action 4.1 Enrichment budgeted expenditures \$ 64,780 and estimated actuals \$ 28,150 difference was due to fewer enrichment center coordinators due to shifts in staffing.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Social Emotional Learning action was effective, as evidenced by % of student feel connected to at least one staff member (As measured by student survey) (84%), by Suspension rate for all students and all significant subgroups (0%), and by Expulsion rate for all students and all significant subgroups (0%). While we are pleased with the progress made, we plan to continue to grow our practices in SEL and school mental health, in order to address the increased needs of our students. The Enrichment and Outdoor Education and Community Experiences actions were effective as evidenced by 100% of students with access to a broad course of study. The Care Corps action was effective as evidenced by 87% of parents who report feeling connected (As measured by parent survey question, “My Rocketship school has a strong

and committed community that actively encourages family participation”), and the portion of parents with input into decision making (Parent survey participation rate–100).

Action 4.2 has been modified to better describe the current camp programs.

Action 4.4 service offerings have been modified in response to feedback from families regarding their needs. The Care Corps program now devotes the majority of their efforts to combatting chronic absenteeism.

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4.3	Social Emotional Learning	At Rocketship Redwood City we look to the Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning (CASEL) to define and describe our intentions when developing programs and measuring students' social-emotional development, the CASEL Framework identifies 5 competencies: self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making. Our daily schedule reflects our value of SEL as every student begins their day with a Community Meeting that blends relationship-building elements with an SEL lesson that includes prosocial skills instruction and highlights our Rocketship core values. Our Tier 1 SEL Curriculum is designed with consideration for the CASEL framework, our Rocketship core values, and culturally responsive pedagogy. Along with our SEL lessons, we have developed a community meeting framework for teachers to ensure there are relationship building opportunities for students to connect, disengage stress, make commitments, and unite as a community. In addition to the classroom level community meeting, each Rocketship campus begins the school day with Launch, which is a period of time for the whole school to come together as a community. This usually includes one of the core values being emphasized and celebrated (i.e., a "core value of the month"). During Launch, the school may also promote a particular successful student habit, such as preparedness, going above and beyond, or kindness/bullying prevention. Schools may also teach a new feature of an incentive or behavior management system. Launch is also a time to promote school-wide academic progress. School leaders may teach everyone a word or idiom of the day or celebrate progress toward achievement goals. Finally, schools may use Launch time to foster school culture and pride, and student engagement. The whole school, including the staff, may learn a song or a dance together or celebrate a particular student or classroom's recent accomplishment. Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) is a framework for creating learning environments that are consistent, predictable, positive, and safe. Our school has a PBIS Team comprised of a cross-section of staff members, including teachers, school leaders, and operational and support staff members, who work to support positive behavior and behavior interventions at the school. We screen students for behavioral and social concerns using a universal screener and provide Tier 2 and Tier 3 social and behavioral support, as needed. We also utilize Wellness Counselors for individual student support and providing small group support working with the SEL curriculum and other evidenced-based and trauma-informed curriculum.	\$ 40,594	No
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4.4	Care Corps	In order for our students to have the capacity to learn and grow--and the space to become life-long learners--they need to have their basic needs (e.g., food, shelter, safety) met. Our Care Corps staff regularly check in with families and teachers throughout the school year to identify families who may benefit from community support in making sure that their students' needs are all met. Care Corps staff are familiar with community resources, including those available to Rocketship families due to partnerships with community organizations, and can refer families to resources that will meet their needs. An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

All Goal 5 actions were implemented as planned.

In **5.2 Family Advocacy and Leadership**, it continues to be a challenge to engage more families in advocacy and leadership work because they lack the confidence in their own expertise.

In **5.3 School-Family Partnership** and **5.4 Los Dichos**, each of our 13 California schools now host a Family Literacy Night at a local library. This shift is inspired by the success of last year’s event with Rocketship Redwood City Prep—featuring a storytime, interactive activities, the Five Finger Rule reading strategy, and community tables. We even enrolled five new students by the end of the night! Parent survey feedback indicates that parents were very satisfied with this event, especially those families who are not often able to attend the Los Dichos events that occur during school hours.

The partnerships with the majority of libraries have been amazing with overall very strong communication and support with providing space and book giveaways for students.

There is a need to strengthen School-Family Partnerships by providing more regular communication with families about student progress using the reports provided by the various assessment systems.

In **5.5 Attendance Initiatives**, we saw success in having Coordinators and Office Managers work closely to identify chronically absent students with the highest needs. Over the past year, our work has shifted from a traditional case management model—supporting 15–20 individual cases each quarter—to a focused, systemic approach targeting Chronic Absenteeism.

Our Coordinators now partner with 40–50 families per site, coordinating and escalating attendance protocols in close collaboration with Operations Managers, Assistant Principals, Principals, and other onsite stakeholders. By actively participating in MTSS meetings, Coordinators provide a critical community-centered perspective, ensuring that family and community needs are integrated into student support planning. All Care Corps Coordinators play an essential role in maintaining Chronic Absenteeism rates low while supporting ADA increases.

RRWC has been identified as in need of additional support due to serving high risk communities facing many out of school barriers. As a result, in 2026-27 they will receive additional Nest partner support and progress monitoring.

Action 5.5 Attendance Initiatives budgeted expenditures \$ 500 and estimated actuals \$ 19,307 difference was due to higher personnel costs than originally budgeted.

Parent Advocacy and Leadership was effective as evidenced by % Home visits completed (99%) School Family Partnership was effective as evidenced by % of parents who are satisfied with their school (reporting as agree or strongly agree on the parent survey) (87%). 5.6 Attendance Initiatives was effective Average Daily Attendance (92.8%), by Chronic Absenteeism rate for all students and all significant subgroups (21.1% overall).

In 5.5 Attendance Initiatives, the action description has been updated to provide more detail on our program to address chronic absenteeism. We have moved away from 9 weeks of case managing 15 families to now doing outreach and support to all chronically absent families.

After reading the book, parents and program facilitators lead activities and discussion on various topics such as family pride, peaceful conflict resolution, and other values. The Los Dichos program includes outreach to families, inviting them to be a part of what is happening in their students' learning. The program helps families, especially those families who speak Spanish or Vietnamese as their primary language, find pathways to help their children to improve their academic achievement and become active participants in the education of their children. The family members begin by taking an introductory course on developmental assets by a Rocketship's Los Dichos staff. We recruit 1 family member from each school site to serve as the Los Dichos lead parent to work in collaboration with school leaders, parents, and Rocketship Coordinators to ensure the program's implementation at each school.  - **Unduplicated Student Group(s):** Regardless of scope, contributing actions serve one or more unduplicated student groups. Indicate one or more unduplicated student groups for whom services are being increased or improved as compared to what all students receive.

 - o This amount is the total of the Planned Expenditures for Contributing Actions (LCFF Funds) column.
- **5. Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services**
 - o This percentage is the total of the Planned Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Planned Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the coming school year (4 divided by 1, plus 5)**

- o This percentage is calculated by dividing the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) by the Projected LCFF Base Grant (1), converting the quotient to a percentage, and adding it to the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5).

Contributing Actions Annual Update Table

Pursuant to *EC* Section 42238.07(c)(2), if the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) is less than the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and Concentration Grants (6), the LEA is required to calculate the difference between the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) and the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (7). - o This amount is the total of the Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services column.

- **Difference Between Planned and Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (Subtract 5 from 8)**

- o This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

LCFF Carryover Table

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
 - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
 - This percentage is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) divided by the LCFF Funding (9), then converting the quotient to a percentage and adding the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).
- **12. LCFF Carryover — Dollar Amount LCFF Carryover (Subtract 11 from 10 and multiply by 9)**
 - If the Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (11) is less than the Estimated Actual Percentage to Increase or Improve Services (10), the LEA is required to carry over LCFF funds.

The amount of LCFF funds is calculated by subtracting the Estimated Actual Percentage to Increase or Improve Services (11) from the Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (10) and then multiplying by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9). This amount is the amount of LCFF funds that is required to be carried over to the coming year.
