Schoolwide Program

Comprehensive Support and Improvement

Adelante Selby Spanish Immersion school is a Title 1 school that receives federal monies and the actions and services align to the requirements for Title 1 expenditures.

The Adelante Selby Spanish Immersion School Site Plan (SPSA) directly connects to the Redwood City School District LCAP. There are three main goals addressed: (1) By June of 2025, every student in the RCSD will receive high quality, grade level instruction and appropriate social-emotional supports designed to meet their needs in an inclusive and supportive environment through the implementation of the Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) framework. (2) By June of 2025, each English Learner (EL) student will progress by a minimum of one level on the ELPAC each school year, with every EL student meeting the criteria for reclassification within 5 years of enrollment in the RCSD. (3) By June of 2025, each RCSD student will make at least one year’s growth in ELA and Math, for each year of enrollment in the RCSD. Students currently scoring more than 1 year below grade level in ELA and/or Math will make 1.5 years of growth each year in order to accelerate progress and close the opportunity gap. Adelante Selby Spanish Immersion School has detailed actions and services that align to the three main goals also found in the RCSD LCAP. The School Site Council discusses these three main goals throughout the school year.

## Surveys

This section provides a description of surveys (i.e., Student, Parent, Teacher) used during the school-year, and a summary of results from the survey(s).

The 2024 Spring Panorama Survey results for our 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade students and families showed that 66% of students felt Safe (5% point gain), 72% of students felt a strong relationship with staff, and 71% of students voiced there are Rigorous Expectations. Two concerns are there was a slight drop in Students feeling Engaged (that was 9% points below the district average) and also School Climate improved 1%, but was 7% below the district average. A highlight was that 89% of Parents/Families felt "Academic Care" by teachers/staff which was 12% better than the district average, and also there was an improvement in Family Engagement which was 5% points better than district average. It should be noted that only 113 families completed the Panorama survey which was less than 1/3 of all families. The Staff survey results showed positive trends with Teacher/Staff-Family Relationships 18% points above the district average and School Climate was 22% above the district average. Staff feelings about Leadership were 28% above the District Average.

The 2023-24 LCAP Student Voice survey information (which came from eight 4th and 5th grade representatives) indicated multiple suggestions and ideas to improve our school in the different Goal areas. Students suggested more after school tutoring for all students, but focusing more on supporting the Newcomer students. They also suggested student welcoming ambassadors for Newcomer students to help them navigate school. They suggested training to help parents to support students with homework. They also asked for more hands-on Science and an actual Science Teacher. They asked for Mental Health and counseling support for students. They asked to have more motivational assembly speakers to talk about respect.

## Classroom Observations

This section provides a description of types and frequency of classroom observations conducted during the school-year and a summary of findings.

Expectations Walk Throughs were done focusing on classroom environment and student engagement in the first month of school. Overall, classrooms were orderly, Agendas, Focus Walls completed with Essential Questions, standards, and sentence frames showed focus of study, and student work was posted. Most classrooms in all grades are currently working on differentiation and building "stamina" allowing for multiple grouping strategies: whole group at tables/desks, independent work, small groups, and large group at carpet. Teachers have set up Peace Corners to help resolve conflicts and for students to self-regulate, Community Circles/Class Meetings are employed daily in the morning (or as needed) to check in on feelings and practice mindfulness to help students focus. Teachers were also observed and given feedback around Cross Linguistic Transfer and Cognates. Teachers in TK-3rd grades continue to implement Integrated Units, alternating units of study between Science and Social Studies themes. Teachers in 3rd- 5th grades are deepening the implementation of Pedagogy of Confidence thinking strategies and scaffolds to elicit High Intellectual Performance. Additionally, this year a district TOSA is providing 1 day a week demonstration lessons for all teachers using the Thinking Maps and strategies from Pedagogy of Confidence. New this year, teachers are working on implementing the new Illustrative Math routines: Warm Up, Activities, Synthesis, Math Games, Cool Down. In K-2 they are learning how to assess and use the routines for the Aprendo a Leer Spanish Phonics supplement while the 3rd-5th grade teachers are learning how to assessing and implement the CRLP program from UC Berkeley (based on the Science of Reading) for teaching literacy and Phonics. Additionally, there was an initial training on "Language Power" in January, an ELD supplement, and we had a walk through with Katherine Rivera during Designated ELD to look at Language Power implementation

## Standards, Assessment, and Accountability

Use of state and local assessments to modify instruction and improve student achievement (ESEA)

(Goal 1) We have slightly higher enrollment this year with 565 students compared to last year's 545 and have added a second TK classroom due to parent demand for our program. TK-1st grade enrollment remains high with waiting lists to get in, but in 3rd-5th grades we are losing students with only a few new students transferring in. Part of the reason for the decline is that students have to pass a test demonstrating they understand Spanish starting in 2nd grade to be accepted into the program. Typically, we are mostly getting Newcomer students at those upper grade levels and not bilingual students. Noteworthy, we have 65% of our families identified as low income or Unduplicated Students which is about the same as last year in 2022-2023. Our target to decrease Chronic Absenteeism significantly was not met for last year although we did improve by 3% overall as we went from 28% in '21/'22 to 25% in '22/'23. The improvement was enough for us to exit ATSI on the CA Dashboard. Current Attendance Data up until April 2024 for Chronic Attendance is at 17% which is well below our Target of 22%. There were no formal suspensions this past year to date and very few disciplinary problems except for a few students in Kindergarten who need more intensive Tier 2 and Tier 3 interventions.

(Goal 2) There were a total of 216 English Learners last year or 40% of all students (see ELPAC 2022-23 Summative Data below)): Level 1 had 18% students, Level 2 had 37%, Level 3 had 35% and level 4 had 11%. The overall percentages in each level remained constant from the previous school year, but overall there were 6% less English Learners. There were 27 students Reclassified as Fluent English Proficient students this school year which was a slight improvement over the previous year. We did not meet the goal of every EL student making one level of progress, but there was a slight improvement in the overall percentage who showed growth over the previous year. A concern is that there are 17 Long Term English Learners in 5th grade this year 2023-2024. We are seeing a need to have more staff development around Designated ELD in order to improve the number of students meeting the goal of "Re-designating" to Fluent English Proficient by 5th grade.

(Goal 3) 2023-24 i-Ready Data At or Above Grade Level 1st-3rd Trimester Comparison: Overall Reading: Trimester 3 - 49% (28% in T1); Overall Math: Trimester 3--32% (10% in T1). Significantly, all ELA and Math i-Ready targets for growth were met for i-Ready with the exception on 5th grade ELA (but they did show an 11% growth). The 2023 CASSPP results for students taking the state test in 3rd-5th grade indicated we met the SPSA targets for Reading overall: 48% (target was 41%) and Math overall: 35% (target was 35%). Significantly, 5th grade ELA showed the most growth on the State test with 56% of students scoring at or above grade level. A concern was 4th and 5th grade Math did not meet the targets on the state test in 2023, but 3rd grade did.

Use of data to monitor student progress on curriculum-embedded assessments and modify instruction (EPC)

Adelante Selby Spanish Immersion has set up a Google Doc where teachers can easily see and monitor all data for all students such as ELPAC, i-Ready, and CAASPP scores for each teacher by homeroom and for Tier 2 Intervention. Teachers can also use Ellevation to track English Learner students progress on ELPAC. The teachers utilize the documents as well as their own formative assessments and observations to establish reading and math groups. The MTSS Leadership Team also utilizes the data for deciding who needs Tier 2 intervention support. Finally, the teachers also use the data for Student Study Team (SST) referrals, parent meetings, IEPs, 504s, and report cards. Teachers have goal setting meetings with the Principal and Assistant Principal around data at the end of Trimester 1 and Trimester 2 utilizing the universal screening data from the new Literacy assessment data and i-Ready assessments to set reading goals for their classes.

RCSD provides staff development personnel to provide professional development and access to instructional materials training with ongoing training and coaching for grade levels and individual teachers as needed.

RCSD ensures that all staff development and professional learning experiences are directly connected to content standards, assessed student performance, and professional needs. This professional development includes SEAL/Integrated Units, POC (Pedagogy of Confidence), CRLP Literacy, and Designated English Language Development training.

Ongoing instructional assistance and support for teachers (e.g., use of content experts and instructional coaches) (EPC)

Adelante Selby Spanish Immersion has access to two district level Literacy/SEAL Integrated Units instructional coaches (TOSA's) for support for SEAL/ELD/CRLP Literacy implementation and Professional Development. New this year is all teachers have access to ongoing support and professional development from a District Coach/TOSA for POC thinking strategies implementation who co-teaches, plans, and does demonstration lessons every Wednesday. Additionally, the school district has calendared eight Super Minimum Early Release days for professional development for the new Illustrative Math curricula, CRLP Science of Reading, Student Led Conferences, and DELD Language Power supplementary curriculum.

Teacher collaboration by grade level (kindergarten through grade eight [K–8]) and department (grades nine through twelve) (EPC)

Grade level planning is provided twice monthly. TK-3rd grade levels are provided Integrate unit planning days. 4th -5th grade teachers are collaborating and are provided planning days to implement POC. 4th and 5th work in "dyads" across grade levels by content area, e.g., the 4th and 5th Math teacher work together. All teachers have access to collaborate with the District POC Coach on Wednesdays.

## Teaching and Learning

English Language Development (ELD) instruction is integrated into the curriculum and instruction in all content areas, and Designated ELD is provided in either small group or whole class. Additionally, some Special Education students SWD/Students with IEPs are pulled out for small group intervention in Reading, Math, DELD, or Speech as per the goals and services listed in their IEP. Reading intervention is provided for underperforming students who need further support in small groups in Grades 1st-5th. Math intervention is provided for students in 4th and 5th grade.

Evidence-based educational practices to raise student achievement

In addition to district expectations for educational practices, Adelante Selby utilizes Integrated Units, Dual Language, POC strategies, and differentiated instructional strategies and practices to raise student achievement. Online curriculum such as I-Ready, Khan Academy, RAZ kids, and EPIC books provide individualized and adaptive content in Math and Reading to raise student achievement.

## Parental Engagement

Familias Unidas and Casa Circulo are two community partners that provide programs and resources to engage parents and families to support student achievement. Additionally, we engage the community with a Science Fair that is combined with a popular Family STEAM night. Acknowledge Alliance also provides Parent Workshops helping families cope with stress and parenting tips. Additionally, the PTO supports the Take Home Reading program for TK-3rd grade. We also have two Scholastic Book Fairs (one in English and one in Spanish) yearly which engages the community in reading.

Involvement of parents, community representatives, classroom teachers, other school personnel, and students in secondary schools, in the planning, implementation, and evaluation of ConApp programs (5 California Code of Regulations 3932)

Adelante Selby Spanish Immersion has a School Site Council and English language Advisory Council to assist in the planning, implementation, and evaluation of ConApp programs. Families participate via the Family Engagement Policy, the annual Panorama Climate survey, and the Site Self-Assessment.

## Involvement Process for the SPSA and Annual Review and Update

The SSC developed the content of the School Plan for Student Achievement --SPSA (EC Section 64001[g][1]). The SPSA was reviewed annually and updated, including proposed expenditures of funds allocated to the school through the ConApp and the local control and accountability plan (LCAP), if any, by the SSC (EC Section 64001[i]). The SSC meets monthly to review the actions and services as set by the SSC. Data was reviewed monthly to determine student progress and progress toward actions and services. The ELAC parents participated in various meetings and provided input in the areas of Parent Involvement Policy, School Compact, review of actions and services and the development of the SPSA. They reviewed and approved the budget.

The members of the SSC represent the composition of the school's pupil population. (EC Section 65000[a]).

The members include principal, classified personnel, classroom teachers, parents of pupils attending, and other members of the community.

The minimum number of SSC members at an elementary school is a total of ten (10) (e.g. 1 principal or his or her designee, 1 other school personnel, 3 classroom teachers, and 5 parent/community members) ELAC reviewed goals and especially around ELL.

## Resource Inequities

Briefly identify and describe any resource inequities identified as a result of the required needs assessment, as applicable.

We are no longer in ATSI as we no longer have any indicators according to the California Dashboard. However, we do still have concerns with Chronic Absenteeism for Students With Disabilities(SWD) (30.7% in 2022-23) and low academic performance in ELA (13% on grade level on CAASPP) and Math (13% on grade level on CAASPP) for Students with Disabilities. For both of these indicators we did show improvement from the 2021-2022 dashboard and actually met our targets in our SPSA plan for SWD students for Academics and "exited" ATSI, but overall both areas remain low.

Chronic Absenteeism has been a challenge for all students (and particularly SWD/Students with IEPs) over the last few years. Our school has created a plan where the MTSS TOSA, RSP/SDC teachers, and Office Staff will monitor and track chronic absenteeism for Students with

Disabilities(SWD). For families with a pattern of Chronic Absenteeism an Attendance Goal will be written into the IEP. Parents will also be contacted via phone call and emails from both the MTSS Coordinator and the RSP/SDC teacher when a student is absent. If the parent is not answering the phone call or email, home visits will be done to check on the welfare of the student and encourage attendance. Incentives will be provided when students are meeting the attendance targets weekly and monthly recognition will be provided as well. Additionally, Parent Meetings will be held with the administration to provide additional support for families. Referrals to Familias Unidas and Casa Círculo parenting classes will be made for parents that need more support.

Academic performance in ELA and Math for Students with Disabilities improved last school year and we met our targets in our SPSA plan, but overall it remains low due to inefficient phonic and reading strategies along with ineffective scaffolding within the classroom. To address the need, this year for Reading, Resource teachers have trained in SIPPs to improve Phonics work, and all teachers are undergoing a shift in how we teach Reading following UC Berkeley's CRLP program(based on the recent Science of Reading research). For Math, teachers are being trained in the new Illustrative Math adoption curriculum that has scaffolding built into its daily lessons and will help address SWD needs in both Resource Math and Mainstream Classroom Math.

This school year (2023-24) the Newcomer Instructional Assistant position was just recently staffed and began on October 6, 2023.

### Identified Need

We have had an increase in enrollment over the last year with 565 students up from 546 students as we have added a second Transitional Kindergarten class. TK-1 enrollment remains high with Waiting Lists to get in, but in 3rd-5th grades we continue to lose students and only a few new students transfer in. Part of the reason for the decline is that students have to pass a test demonstrating they understand Spanish starting in 2nd grade to be accepted into the program. Typically, we are mostly getting Newcomer students at those upper grade levels and not bilingual students. Significantly, we had 62% of our families identified as low income (Unduplicated Students) this year (2023-24).

Our target to decrease Chronic Absenteeism was not met for last year, but there was a slight (3%) improvement going from 28.4% in 2021-22 to 25% last year 2022-23. There was also a slight (3%) improvement of Chronic Absenteeism for Students With Disabilities/IEPs from 33.7% to 30.7%. Even though our targets were not met, we successfully exited ATSI as per the CA Dashboard. A target this school year will be a 5% improvement of SWD/Students with IEPs to 25.7%. We have set an overall Target of 22% Chronic Absenteeism for this school year. As per the most current Attendance Data(see Data below), we are on track to meet all of our grade level attendance targets set in the Fall. The current year to date (as of April 2024) Overall, the most current Chronic Attendance Rate (from April 2024) is 17% which is a 5% improvement over our 22% target.

Chronic Absenteeism continues to be a concern/challenge for all students (and particularly SWD/Students with IEPs). Our school has created a plan where the MTSS TOSA, RSP/SDC teachers, and Office Staff will monitor and track chronic absenteeism for Students with Disabilities(SWD). For families with a pattern of Chronic Absenteeism an Attendance Goal will be written into the IEP. Parents will also be contacted via phone call and emails from both the MTSS Coordinator and the RSP/SDC teacher when a student is absent. If the parent is not answering the phone call or email, home visits will be done to check on the welfare of the student and encourage attendance. Incentives will be provided when students are meeting the attendance targets weekly and monthly recognition will be provided as well. Additionally, Parent Meetings will be held with the administration to provide additional support for families. Referrals to Familias Unidas and Casa Circulo parenting classes will be made for parents that need more support.

We continue to implement our PBIS plan and follow the MTSS framework to provide counseling groups or therapy via One Life for students with greater needs. There have been no formal Suspensions this school year (2023-24) and very few disciplinary problems in general with the notable exception of a few students in Kindergarten who struggle with significant behavioral challenges. The district behaviorist is supporting the teachers and students with these individuals who need more Tier 2 level of support.

There were a total of 216 English Learners last year or 40% of all students (see ELPAC 2022-23 Summative Data below): Level 1 had 18% students, Level 2 had 37%, Level 3 had 35% and level 4 had 11%. The overall percentages in each level remained constant from the previous school year, but overall there were 6% less English Learners. There were 29 students Reclassified as Fluent English Proficient students this school year which was a slight improvement over the previous year. We did not meet the goal of every EL student making one level of progress, but there was a slight improvement in the overall percentage who showed growth over the previous year. A concern is that there are 17 Long Term English Learners in 5th grade this year. There is a school wide designated ELD time where students are grouped at levels to meet their needs. In order to address the concerns and meet our targets this year, we have also added an Instructional Assistant to support Newcomer and Level 1 EL students. Tier 2 intervention teachers are also using DELD strategies in small groups. Teachers are utilizing the new Designated ELD supplement "Language Power", but we are seeing a need to have more staff development around "Language Power" and DELD strategies in general in order to improve the number of students meeting the goal of "Redesignating" to Fluent English Proficient by 5th grade.

### Identified Need

For i-Ready, in both Reading and Math, all grade levels met the SPSA targets we established as a School Site Council this year with the exception of the 5th grade ELA (who missed the target by 4%, but did increase/grow by 11% overall from the Fall test). Significantly, there was some good growth demonstrated increasing the percentage of students scoring at or above grade level. This school year's i-Ready Data 1st-3rd Trimester 2023-2024 Comparison: Overall Reading: Green/Tier--49% Trimester 3 from 27% in Trimester 1. Overall Math: Green Tier --32% in Trimester 3 from 9% in Trimester 1. The 2023 CAASPP results correlated with 2023 Trimester 3 i-Ready 2023 results as 48% of the 3rd-5th graders were at or above grade level in Reading(compared to 46% on i-Ready), and in Math overall only 33% of students in 3rd-5th scored at or above grade level on the state test compared to 31% of 3rd-5th on i-Ready. All SPSA targets were met for Reading in CAASPP Language Arts overall moving from 36% at or above grade level in 2022 to 48% in 2023. There was significant growth in reading in all grade levels, but 5th grade CAASPP results in particular showed the greatest improvement moving from 38% at or above grade level in 4th grade 2022 to 55% in 5th grade 2023 (17% improvement!). In Math, we did not meet our targets in CAASPP with the notable exception of 3rd grade. The 3rd grade met the target with 49% of students scoring at or above grade level on the Math CASSPP test. The 4th and 5th grade results in Math were significantly lower than 3rd grade in terms of percentage at or above grade level which is a concern. Finally, it should be mentioned that the SWD/Students with IEPs subgroup met all academic targets we established for iReady Reading and Math and also for CAASPP Reading and Math and we are no longer in ATSI on the state dashboard. However, it is still a concern that the SWD group is only is at 13% at grade level in Reading and Math.

3. Be based on a school-level needs assessment (Goal, Identified Need, Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes, Annual Review and Update, as applicable); and
4. Identify resource inequities, which may include a review of LEA- and school-level budgeting, to be addressed through implementation of the CSI plan (Goal, Identified Need, Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes, Planned Strategies/Activities; and Annual Review and Update, as applicable).

### Targeted Support and Improvement

In partnership with stakeholders (including principals and other school leaders, teachers, and parents) the school shall develop and implement a school-level TSI plan to improve student outcomes for each subgroup of students that was the subject of identification (Stakeholder Involvement).

The TSI plan shall:

1. Be informed by all state indicators, including student performance against state-determined long-term goals (Goal, Identified Need, Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes, Annual Review and Update, as applicable); and
2. Include evidence-based interventions (Planned Strategies/Activities, Annual Review and Update, as applicable). (For resources related to evidence-based interventions, see the U.S. Department of Education's "Using Evidence to Strengthen Education Investments" <https://www2.ed.gov/policy/elsec/leg/essa/guidanceuseseseinvestment.pdf>.)

## **Additional Targeted Support and Improvement**

A school identified for ATSI shall:

1. Identify resource inequities, which may include a review of LEA- and school-level budgeting, which will be addressed through implementation of its TSI plan (Goal, Identified Need, Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes, Planned Strategies/Activities, and Annual Review and Update, as applicable).

## **Single School Districts and Charter Schools Identified for School Improvement**

Single school districts (SSDs) or charter schools that are identified for CSI, TSI, or ATSI, shall develop a SPSA that addresses the applicable requirements above as a condition of receiving funds (EC Section 64001[a] as amended by Assembly Bill [AB] 716, effective January 1, 2019).

However, a SSD or a charter school may streamline the process by combining state and federal requirements into one document which may include the local control and accountability plan (LCAP) and all federal planning requirements, provided that the combined plan is able to demonstrate that the legal requirements for each of the plans is met (EC Section 52062[a] as amended by AB 716, effective January 1, 2019).

Planning requirements for single school districts and charter schools choosing to exercise this option are available in the LCAP Instructions.
