The Roy Cloud School Site Plan directly connects to the Redwood City School District LCAP. There are three main goals addressed:

1. By June of 2027, every student in the RCSD will receive appropriate social-emotional support designed to meet their needs in an inclusive and supportive environment through the implementation of the Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) framework.

By June of 2027, the LEA aims to reduce Chronic Absenteeism by 3% each year in all student groups across the LEA, specifically the African American Students and student groups at English learners at Clifford, Henry Ford.

Improve Attendance rate by 2% each year in all groups.

Reduce suspensions by 0.5% for district and other sub groups: SED, ELs, Homeless each year and by 1% annually for African Americans, and Students with Disabilities, sub group of English Learners LTELs.

2. By June of 2027, 55% of 2nd- 8th grade English Learner (EL) students will progress by a minimum of one level on the ELPAC each school year as measured by Summative ELPAC Assessment.

Increase our reclassification rate to 20%.

Decrease our Long Term English Learner to 10%

3. By June of 2027, all RCSD students will increase at least 4% annually in ELA and Math on iReady, the district's local assessment program.

By June 2027, RCSD goal is to increase the percentage of students meeting expected annual growth by at least 4 percentage points each year in ELA and Math, as measured by i-Ready, the district's local assessment program.

English learner students in grades 3-8 will increase in meeting or exceeding the standard in ELA to 20% and in Math to 16% on the CAASPP, the state assessment program.

Roy Cloud School has detailed actions and services that align to the three main goals of the RCSD LCAP. Each School Site Council meeting discusses programs and personnel relating to these three main goals.

Surveys

This section provides a description of surveys (i.e., Student, Parent, Teacher) used during the school-year, and a summary of results from the survey(s).

This year the Healthy Kids Survey indicated that in 4th grade, 61% of students feel academically successful, while in 5th grade 42% feel successful. There is an opportunity to look into practices like Universal Design For Learning to see if enhancing approaches and equitably access would improve these scores. Furthermore, 83% of 4th grade students indicated that they have a positive relationship with an adult on campus. While 70% of 5th graders felt they had a positive relationship with an adult. In 4th grade 81% felt that they have high expectations set for them. In 5th grade 84% feel that they have high expectations set for them. In 4th grade, 45% of students feel like they are having meaningful experiences in school, while in 5th grade 37% are. This is an area of need. A huge highlight is that 78% of 4th graders feel a sense of connectedness and 81% of 5th graders feel the same. Finally, 85% of students are motivated to do well in 4th grade while 80% are in 5th grade.

In Middle School, the percentages range from 59-78% of students feeling like they have a caring adult on campus. There is a range of 68-85% of students feeling like they have high expectations set for them. A point to consider is that 29-54% of students in middle school feel like they are having meaningful experiences. And between 58-79% of students are motivated to do well.

Generally, 78% of students feel they have strong foundations in SEL practices, 78% feel that the school is fair, 92% feel as though there are positive behavioral responses to discipline, and 76% feel as though there are expectations around anti-bullying.

Classroom Observations

This section provides a description of types and frequency of classroom observations conducted during the school-year and a summary of findings.

Site Administration (Principal and Assistant Principal) visit classrooms at least weekly to observe the classroom environment, academic instruction, and implementation of district-adopted curriculum, PTO-funded programs, and our Social Emotional Learning program through implementation of lessons based on Character Strong. Observations of teacher and student behavior has led to focused work in the area of enhancing student engagement in grades TK-8, and focusing attention around the RCSD Learner Framework. Findings include strong grade level team collaboration; experienced staff; occasional cross grade level collaboration; teachers supplementing the curriculum; enhancing lesson plans to address student needs efficiently and effectively with the use of the MTSS Framework, UDL strategies and Equity in Education/Pedagogy of Confidence coaching and implementation.

Standards, Assessment, and Accountability

Use of state and local assessments to modify instruction and improve student achievement (ESEA)

Roy Cloud uses state and district assessments to modify instruction and improve student achievement, including SBAC, CAST, CAA (grades 3-8), iReady Diagnostics (grades K-8), CRLP framework and BPST phonics assessments, Heggerty phonics, Literably, as well as benchmark assessments in the district-adopted math curriculum Illustrative Math. This information was helpful to gauge student readiness levels entering the 2024-25 school year and will be used to analyze growth patterns. Currently, districtwide, the iReady online assessment, CRLP, BPST, and Literably are used for progress monitoring for Phonics, Reading and Math. The assessments are administered multiples times each school year. K-2 Teachers were provided substitute teachers so they could work 1:1 with students administering all other assessments. The district provided support in administering the ELPAC to our Emerging Multilingual students. The ALPI is used for qualified students in special education. Roy Cloud also initiated a student portfolio program where benchmark assessments are collected and stored for educators to review to learn more about their scholars. Currently we are collecting writing samples with district-created rubrics to help inform our practice.

Use of data to monitor student progress on curriculum-embedded assessments and modify instruction (EPC)

Continuing from previous years, Roy Cloud is dedicated to embedding a systematic plan for data collection and analysis to ensure students have access to intervention levels 1, 2, and 3 as part of a comprehensive Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) plan. In 25-25 a universal screener will be implemented to support the understanding of foundational reading and phonics skills. The Roy Cloud staff continues to use a bank of universal practices developed in 22-23 to support our multiple learners in an effort to increase access to the curriculum in ways that made more sense to them. This bank/menu of universal practices lives in the Roy Cloud Staff Handbook and is used as part of the intervention process when supporting student needs. This menu is also being used district-wide to support the district's MTSS/SST initiative.

Staffing and Professional Development

All permanent Redwood City School District (RCSD) staff are highly qualified.

RCSD provides staff development personnel to provide professional development and to provide access to instructional materials/training, and coaching for grade levels and individual teachers, as needed.

Alignment of staff development to content standards, assessed student performance, and professional needs (ESEA)

RCSD ensures all staff development and professional learning experiences are directly connected to content standards, assessed student performance and professional needs. This includes trainings from SMCOE's School Safety and Risk Prevention personnel, Pedagogy of Confidence (POC), and Character Strong.

Ongoing instructional assistance and support for teachers (e.g., use of content experts and instructional coaches) (EPC)

Roy Cloud has access to district coaches, who provide professional development and resources. This year, funds were used to secure a full time Reading Intervention Specialist for grades K-8; a full time LMFT; a full time Academic Counselor (split with site funds); a full time PE teacher for grades 6-8; a full time Music teacher (split with site funds). Funds from our PTO support fifty percent of a STEAM TOSA to support instruction for all students in the NGSS and ISTE standards for all students, while the district supports the other 50%. Throughout the year, the Roy Cloud staff meets as a site to collaborate and discuss important instructional practices between grades. Finally, the middle school staff meets with neighboring high schools to inform practices and support the preparation of for our scholars.

Teacher collaboration by grade level (kindergarten through grade eight [K-8]) and department (grades nine through twelve) (EPC)

Grade Level Planning (Tk-8) and Department (Specialists, 6-8) Planning is scheduled during our staff meetings at least twice a month, in addition to the regular planning teachers engage in. In addition to this, all teachers engaged in staff development to learn, apply, and enhance the district's approach to improving ELA, Math, and UDL practices/curriculum. This year, we are also dedicating much of our staff time together to learn and grow in data analysis via our PLC work.

Teaching and Learning

Alignment of curriculum, instruction, and materials to content and performance standards (ESEA)

All curriculum, instruction and materials are aligned to content and performance standards, per district guidelines. We continue with integrated STEAM Units in grades TK-8.

Lesson pacing schedule (K–8) and master schedule flexibility for sufficient numbers of intervention courses (EPC)

Lesson pacing schedule (TK–8) and master schedule flexibility are per district guidelines to ensure teachers are progressing through content. By the end of the year, students have been exposed to all grade level content standards.

RCSD ensures that all students have access to Standards based instructional materials appropriate to all student groups and in accordance with the Williams Act requirements

Use of SBE-adopted and standards-aligned instructional materials, including intervention materials, and for high school students, access to standards-aligned core courses (EPC)

Roy Cloud School uses SBE-adopted and standards-aligned instructional materials. Additionally, reading intervention specialists use evidenced-based instructional materials; our resource specialists and special education teachers utilize additional evidences-based programs (SIPPS and READ180, for example) based on student need.

Opportunity and Equal Educational Access

Services provided by the regular program that enable underperforming students to meet standards (ESEA)

English Language Development (Emerging Multilingual) instruction is integrated into the curriculum and instruction, as well as provided focused time with our Intervention Specialist with supplemental material of Language Power. Roy Cloud has three Specialized Learning Centers for students in grades K-2, 3-5 and 6-8. All are mainstreamed for portions of their day in general education classes, according to their IEP goals. TK-8 Students in the Resource Learning Center program receive push in and pullout services according to their IEPs, and to ensure access to the regular program. Furthermore, Roy Cloud has created a peer:peer leadership model where middle school students meet with 1-3rd grade students who would benefit from additional support after school. Our middle schoolers are dismissed at 2:50 pm. Our 1st-3rd grade students are dismissed at 2:25 pm. When these students are dismissed, they meet with middle school students to gain extra practice and instruction in foundational skills until the 2:50 pm dismissal. This program has proven beneficial for our young scholars in an academic sense, as well as in supporting our families who may need assistance with the multiple dismissal times.

Evidence-based educational practices to raise student achievement

In addition to district expectations for educational practices, Roy Cloud includes MTSS instruction in small groups for math, reading and online applications such as iReady activities for Reading and Math, Actively Learn, Newsela and Literably.

Parental Engagement

The Roy Cloud Community including family, school, and district offers resources to support students who are underachieving, including support from a Reading Intervention Specialist, parent education events, and additional support for an academic counselor.

Roy Cloud School has a School Site Council involved in the planning, implementation, and evaluation of programs. Emerging Multilingual Learner categories and topics are included on each SSC agenda. Parents also participate through the Site Self Assessment and the Annual Climate Survey. We are currently engaging with our Emerging Multilingual Learner population regarding the interest and start of an ELAC committee.

Funding

State and Local funding provide services in the areas of Academic Counseling, a full time LMFT, a Reading Intervention Teacher, Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) education, assistance for Individualized Education Plans (IEPs) and Student Success Teams (SST) meetings, attendance monitoring, and MTSS Tier 1, 2 and 3 support.

Fiscal support (EPC)

Fiscal support is provided through local Measure U dollars as well as from the site PTO.

Resource Inequities

Roy Cloud School serves a diverse student population, yet faces resource gaps that impact cultural awareness, student voice, and equitable access to meaningful experiences. Our curriculum and celebrations lack consistent cultural representation, limiting opportunities for students to see their identities reflected at school. Student leadership and feedback structures are underdeveloped, particularly for historically marginalized groups. Additionally, access to enrichment programs and supportive spaces is uneven, leading to feelings of disconnection for some students. To address these inequities, Roy Cloud aims to:

Expand culturally responsive curriculum and inclusive events

Create structured opportunities for student voice and leadership

Increase access to enrichment, mentorship, and restorative spaces

 - iv. Develop the comprehensive needs assessment with the participation of individuals who will carry out the schoolwide program plan.
 - v. Document how it conducted the needs assessment, the results it obtained, and the conclusions it drew from those results.
